## Students use iPad during Reading Class

This year, 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> grade classes are being introduced to the iPad as an educational tool to enhance reading instruction and increase accessibility for students with low vision. Mrs. Picard and Mr. Kelley are working in cooperation with Mrs. Finley to help students use this valuable and versatile technology. And the students are loving it!

Recently, Bookshare, a service that provides free books in several electronic formats, has unveiled a new application for the iPad called Read2go. Read2go allows the user to download books from Bookshare and read them on the iPad. The user can customize the font size (up to 70 point), change background and foreground colors and even use it as a listening device by activating the auditory function.

Students in Mrs. Finley's reading classes will be using iPads to read Edward Bloor's Tangerine as a class activity. Already, the motivation to read is increasing as students look forward to using these devices. ## Let's Move in School

Understanding the difference between physical education and physical activity is critically important to understanding why both contribute to the development of healthy, active children. Physical education, the foundation of a comprehensive school physical activity program, offers the best opportunity to provide physical activity to all children and to teach them the skills and knowledge needed to establish and sustain an active lifestyle. Physical education teachers assess student knowledge, motor and social skills, and provide instruction in a safe, supportive environment.

Physical activity is bodily movement of any type and may include recreational, fitness and sport activities such as jumping rope, playing soccer, lifting weights, as well as daily activities such as walking to the store, taking the stairs or raking the leaves. The National Association for Sport and Physical Education (NASPE) recommends school-age children accumulate at least 60 minutes and up to several hours of physical activity per day and avoid prolonged periods of inactivity.

By participating in physical education class and doing physical activity, your children will reduce their risk for being overweight, assist in improved academic performance and help them feel better about themselves. I hope your family will join our Let's Move in School efforts!


### ABOUT GUIDING EYES FOR THE BLIND

## NCASB Track and Field Championships

The following male athletes participated in the NCASB Track and Field Championships in Nashville, Tennessee on October 1, 2011 – Donald Stewart, Jerrimia Williams-Smith, Kaleb Cutlip, and Seth Pettey. The boys scored 28 team points. Individually, Donald, Class B, place 6<sup>th</sup> in the 60 meter dash, 6<sup>th</sup> in the standing long jump, 5<sup>th</sup> in the standing triple jump, and also participated in the 3 – consecutive jump. Jerrimia and Kaleb in Class C, participated in the 60 meter dash and the shot put. Seth, Class C, placed 3<sup>rd</sup> in the 800 meter run, 3<sup>rd</sup> in the 1600 meter run, 3<sup>rd</sup> in the long jump and 3<sup>rd</sup> in the triple jump.

Seth also gets his name added to the OSSB All Star list in the 800 and 1600 runs. Congratulations Guys!!

OSSB female athletes participating in the NCASB Track and Field Championships in Nashville, Tennessee October 1st were – Sarah Hawke, Raven Lewis, Tazhanae Johnson, and Michelle Motil. Sarah, Class B, placed 5<sup>th</sup> in the shot put, 6<sup>th</sup> in the 600 meter shuttle, 5<sup>th</sup> in the standing long jump and ran the 60 meter dash. Raven Lewis, Class B, placed 2<sup>nd</sup> in the standing triple jump, 4<sup>th</sup> in the 3 consecutive jump, 3<sup>rd</sup> in the 600 meter shuttle, and 4<sup>th</sup> in the 60 meter dash. Tazhanae, Class A, placed 3<sup>rd</sup> in the standing long jump, 2<sup>nd</sup> in the shot put, 2<sup>nd</sup> in the 60 meter dash, and 3<sup>rd</sup> in the standing triple jump. Michelle, Class A, placed 3<sup>rd</sup> in the 60 meter dash, 2<sup>nd</sup> in the standing triple jump, and 1<sup>st</sup> in the shot put.



Congratulations to Michelle for breaking our school shot put record. The record was held by Kayla Rollison at 15' 5"; Michelle now holds the record at 15' 5.5". Michelle, Raven and Tazhanae also added their names to the OSSB All Star list for their track events. The girls tied for 4<sup>th</sup> with 79 points. Congratulations Girls!!

## High School Launches Anti-Bullying Campaign

The end of September marked the kickoff of a scheduled year-long campaign against bullying at OSSB. All high school students and staff took part in the 2-hour workshop which featured an inspirational speaker. Spearheading the program are Mrs. Christine Croyle and Mrs. Pat Wilson, co-chairs, with Ms. Alison Brewer-Wood and Mr. Jim Peterfish. Students were divided into small groups of 8 and were asked to describe what bullying looks like. Their answers showed that bullying has many faces: hitting, pushing, kicking, name-calling, but also gossiping, shunning, starting rumors, and using technology to send hurtful messages. Most felt that bullying is not a serious problem at OSSB.

The featured speaker was Mrs. Shannon Mangon, of Thornville, who started an anti-bullying focus group, Rise Above, in memory of her 16-year-old daughter Lauren. Lauren, who died in a car accident last summer, had been bullied throughout her life. Rise Above offers support for both bullies and their victims. A second workshop was held on October 18. Students in Mrs. Tara McCarthy's vocational workshop program won first place in the slogan contest with a poster and buttons which said, "Take a Stand, Lend a Hand."

Mrs. McCarthy challenged the widely held viewpoint that bullying isn't a problem at OSSB. She named a number of behaviors classified as bullying, intimidation or harassment, and asked those who had ever experienced them, as victim or bully, to stand. Soon, most of the students were on their feet. A spirited discussion followed. Mrs. McCarthy challenged students to be proactive, to reach out and try to disarm a bullying incident before it develops.

Anti-Bullying programs are springing up in schools and other organizations all over the U.S. and around the world. OSSB students and staff are hopeful that the monthly meetings will encourage everyone to take a stand against bullying, harassment and intimidation, and lend a hand stop it from happening here.
