OSSB's Vocational Garden Program

The OSSB vocational department started a new gardening program for students this school year. Steven Nagy, a local Eagle Scout and brother of OSSB student Sydney, created and built six raised beds for our students to use and learn valuable work skills. In May, students helped plant several types of lettuce, onions, basil, tomatoes, cilantro and other herbs. The goal of this project was two-fold. The first was to learn basic work skills, and

the second was to incorporate more healthy choices into students diets. Students from around Ohio enrolled in OSSB's two-week career exploration and four-week Work and Learn camps, helped maintain the gardens during the summer. The vocational department is currently working with administration to provide an indoor greenhouse space, so students have a year-long opportunity to work on these new skills.

Poetry Out Loud, Creating Confidence

This year I got tire honor of being a part of Poetry Out Loud. Poetry Out Loud is a

competition that requires all high school students to recite poetry out loud. The first year that I tried it I didn't do so great. The second year I did better than I thought I would. But the third year took the cake. By this time I knew what the judges expected. I knew what they wanted to see and hear. So I gave them the best that I could, and it paid off big time.

The day of Poetry Out Loud I got to school late, because I missed the bus. But my mom got me to school minutes before I had to compete. I was ridiculously nervous. My mind kept throwing pieces of the poems that I'd chosen at me. "Leaps on the back," "Floats down," "Escape me? Never!" "Dips his wing," My hands and knees were shaking. I had to keep reminding myself to breathe. I kept telling myself that everything was fine.

"Once again welcome to Whetstone High School, and we hope that you enjoy this year's Poetry Out Loud!" My stomach was in knots the entire time. My eyes were all over the place. Seeing, but not seeing. There were two boys beside me, one to the left and one to the right. They were both really nervous. I think that's what calmed me down. The fact that I wasn't the only nervous person there gave me strength. Their nervousness gave me confidence. And once I had that confidence it was like nothing could touch me.

When it was my turn to go on stage my mind went blank. All of the words in my first poem disappeared. There was nothing but silence as my resource teacher helped me to the microphone. I stood there for seemed like minutes, but in reality it was only a few seconds. I took a deep breath in, let it out, and the words came rushing back. I was

excited, but I didn't let it show. I recited my poem with appropriate 'dramaticness' I didn't go overboard, but I did give it a little twist. When I was finished everyone started clapping and saying my name. I was back on cloud 9 again and this time I wasn't letting go.

The other students went and when they were finished we had a 10-minute break. My mom and my sister came over and talked to me. Just hearing them say that I did a good job made me feel like I might just move on to the second round. All of the other students were walking around, talking, and dancing. But I was sitting at the edge of my seat. I was perfectly poised, waiting, listening, and hoping. The top five students were announced to recite their second poem, and I was the first person to get called. With the assistance of my resource teacher I went up on stage again and recited my second and last poem. In

this poem I knew that I could let all of my joy out. I knew that I could show everyone how excited I was through the words in this poem. So I did. My heart was overflowing with happiness. If I could have touched every person in the audience and gave them some of my joy I would have. I was just that filled.

After I was finished, the final four students went up and recited their poems. Everyone had an awesome poem. I started to get just a little nervous again. The what ifs came creeping back in. What if I skipped a word or two? What if I didn't have the right amount of expression? What if I don't place? Will everyone still be proud? The top three winners were announced. "Third place goes to..." I didn't make it. "Second place goes to..." I know I didn't make it, there's just no way. "First place goes to..." I lost, game over. "Ebony Bays-Holley!" I couldn't believe it! I

jumped up and my resource teacher and I hugged. I was so happy. Everyone was clapping and screaming my name. I Eboni Bays-Holley had done it. I won.

STABLE Account /ABLE Act

STABLE accounts are new, and Ohio is one of only three states currently offering this investment account for eligible individuals with disabilities and their families. The ABLE Act

(Achieving A Better Life Experience ACT) allows individuals to save and invest money without losing eligibility for certain needs-based public benefits like Medicaid, Supplemental Security Income (SSI) and Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI). Earnings in the STABLE account are not subject to Federal Income Tax as long as they are spent on qualified disability expenses. Once enrolled, you may request a STABLE Card, a loadable prepaid debit card to use like a credit card when making qualified purchases.

Individuals with disabilities who open a STABLE Account may save up to \$14,000 each year. This money may then be used for basic living expenses, transportation, education, assistive technology, health prevention and wellness, and more.
